Blast From the Past

Petrocelli

"The Outsiders" (1975)

The owner of a drugstore, Andrew Sloan, had been murdered, and a few people are hunting a man down the street. (If you take a closer look at this opening scene you'll spot a well-known face.)

The sun of a farmer, Ron Fields (played by Mitch Vogel) had been arrested for murder. His mother goes to Anthony Petrocelli (Barry Newman) to ask for help because she knows her son had never done it - that he's not guilty. They just stopped in Reno because her sick husband needed some medicine very badly. That's why she asked Ron to get to the drugstore to get some. Tony decided to help them not thinking about a possible payment.

The district attorney believes that only Ron Fields can be the murder of Andrew Sloan - telling Tony his version of that evening: the owner of the petrol station across the street watched a man that tried to get into the closed drugstore and called the police. So Petrocelli starts his own investigations with the help of Pete (played by Albert Salmi) - his friend and assistant. He talks with Sloan's widow and learned that it seems that Sloan didn't have any enemies. Everybody describes him as a very kind man. He also learned something

more interesting from the owner of that petrol station: the owners of the properties in that street got offers to sell them because a company wants to build their new apartment blocks. All wanted to sell – except one: Andrew Sloan. Could that be the reason why Sloan had been killed?

Then Petrocelli wants to talk with Mr Mitchell owner of another store in that street but he only meets his son David (Mark Hamill). Again he heard only good things about Mr. Sloan. David tells him that he doesn't know anything about what happened that evening and tells Tony where to find his father. At the barber's he meets David's father. He and the barbershop's owner calling Sloan a fool – that he should have sold, too. And they're happy that he's dead because now they can take that offer to sell.

By know Pete had checked all the prescriptions and found something interesting. A man called, Harry Elden received his medication twice a week – only that he died six months ago. So why did Sloan use his name? Tony asks Pete to check if there's someone who was or is addicted to drugs. We know Pete doing his job well.

So in the court he asks David's father if he had heard about the "Seltinger Hospital" in Flagstaff, Arizona – a drug detoxification center. His answer was yes. And he answers the next question whether his son

was a patient there with a yes, too - and that David had returned seven months ago. That was all Petrocelli wants to know - now he wants to talk with David. David explained that he's clean now that he no longer needs drugs. But then Tony asks him to show him his arms but he refuses to do it. So Tony is able now to tell what really happened in that night: David still needs drugs; can't live without them. He broke in to the drugstore knowing exactly where Mr Sloan had the drugs, in a special locker at the back of the store. That night Mr Sloan caught David but didn't call the police. He wanted to help David and got the drugs for him. But then he realized that he can't really help him that it would be the best if David would go back to the hospital. He refused to give him drugs again. That night David needed the drugs badly and broke in again. With a scissors, he tried to open the locker when Mr. Sloan came in. When he pushed David against the wall, he was mortally wounded by the scissors. It was never David's intention to kill him. He hid against a shelf when Ron came in and found the dead body. He was afraid, backed off, and run. Shortly after him, David left the drugstore. If the owner of the petrol station had waited a bit longer he would have seen David, too coming out of the drugstore.

David repeated that it was not his intention to kill

Sloan. So Ron got his freedom back.

"The Gamblers"

The owner of a store, Al Benton, was murdered. Theresa Riviera goes to Tony Petrocelli because her brother had been arrested for the murder. She and her brother Manuel look after their two younger siblings because their parents are on a trip in Mexico.

So Tony talks with Manuel. He was running errands for Mr. Benton. That night he went back to the store because he had forgotten his notebook there which he needed for school. The back door was open and he went in. He found Al Benton dead on the floor. He hid when two other men were looking for Mr. Benton – then he ran away, afraid they would think he did it.

The district attorney tells Tony that they found Manuel's finger prints on the knife – and that they had found the notebook he mentioned and that Manuel had an argument with Benton earlier that evening. They also found the cash register open and found over 300 dollars in Manuel's car that he didn't tell Tony.

The investigation starts. Tony and Pete find out that Al Benton was a bookie—that lots of people owe him lots of money—bet debts—for example, Mr. Melon owes \$5,000. When Tony meets him, he runs away thinking he was sent by Benton to force the money from him and to set him under pressure.

One evening Tony and his wife are at the Riviera's house. Theresa invites them for dinner. Tony spotted some postcards from their parents but something isn't right with them. He needs to talk with Manuel again – and not only about this.

Indeed, Manuel admits that he had money in his car because he doesn't trust banks. He also admits that he had an argument that he wanted to guit his job because Benton had used him for his illegal business. Mr. Benton told him that he can't quit because he is already a part of that business and set him under pressure. And he also tells Tony that his parents died in a car accident three months ago. He writes the cards so his younger siblings believe their parents are okay – he just can't tell them the truth. After school he's working to get enough money to pay all the bills. Now that he's in jail he's afraid that social workers could find out the truth about his parents and that they would put his siblings into an orphanage.

By now Pete found out that much more people owed Al Benton lots of money: James Wylie owed him around \$7,000 and a guy named Gomez around \$3,000. And there's some still inexplicable break-ins they should check. So Pete should find Gomez while Tony wants to talk with James Wylie.

Tony doesn't meet James Wylie just his son Dennis (Mark Hamill) working on a car trying to repair it. Tony offers the help of a mechanic but Dennis explained that he wouldn't have the money. He tells Tony that his parents aren't at home. He talks about his father's addiction to betting. In his eyes, it's an

illness that he wants to help his father overcome because he owes him that. When he was ill as a kid his father was at his side – he even lost his job back then. So he gives his father the money he gets working in a restaurant. With some disgust he tells Tony where he can find his father.

We know Pete won't give up finding out all about tricky things – this time more about these break ins. The thief always took money never other things and he never took all the money – only a few hundreds dollars every time. Both men are starting to check Mr. Benton's book and compared them with the break ins trying to find something that could bring them further to their goal. They find out that James Wylie had always paid his debts on the last day of the month – and the break-ins were always a few days earlier. Is that the solution?

In the court Tony wants to talk with James Wylie who admits getting money from his son. At this point he wants to talk with Dennis. He asked him how it can be possible to give his father that much money but only getting thirty-five dollars every week for his job. So Petrocelli can now start to explain what really happened that night: Dennis was making one of his break-ins – as always wearing gloves. It was easy for him to open that door, too after so many other break-ins he did before. He opened the cash registry with a large knife he found when Al Benton came in and run directly into the knife. It wasn't Dennis' intention to kill him.

For the records, there's another episode of that series called "Edge Of Evil" that should be interesting. No, it isn't another episode with Mark. Two other well-known actors – Harrison Ford and William Shatner – star in it..

Mark's voice over work started a very long time ago – back in the early seventies with a Hanna-Barbera cartoon. But his role in "Wizards" is very small: just a few lines until his character – Sean, King of the mountain fairies - got shoot. Lots of you know his voice. But before Sean even



starts talking you'll recognize him as Mark's character. All of you who know the film will agree – it's the look of Sean – his big blue eyes and the blond hair – a real cute little fellow.

Just a warning at the end: you must have a soft spot for the films by Ralph Bakshi to like this film. Otherwise you would only watch these very few minutes with Sean. "Wizards" is an animation film for an adult audience. And it'll take a while till you reach the scene that is interesting for you.
