
A Mark of Excellence

'Walking Across Egypt' J

In October, I had the privilege of seeing Mark's new film, "Walking Across Egypt," at the Heartland Film Festival in Indianapolis, and I can't begin to say enough about what a wonderful film this is! "Walking Across Egypt" is a screen adaptation of Clyde Edgerton's book of the same title, and the film delightfully captures all the humor. drama and southern charm that is found in Mr. Edgerton's writing. This heartwarming and uplifting movie centers around

a kindhearted, feisty elderly lady named Mattie (played by Ellen Burstyn) who befriends, and then gives a home to, a troubled youth named Wesley (played by Jonathan Taylor Thomas), despite her own reservations about how she's "slowing down" too much to take care of "strays."

Mark appears in the film as Wesley's uncle, Lamar (the town dogcatcher), and he did a superb job with this role! Mark played the comedic elements of the role to perfection, and had the audience roaring with laughter during quite a few of his scenes. In fact, that was something that struck me very strongly throughout the entire screening - how wonderfully the audience responded to Mark! That warm, "fuzzy" feeling towards Mark started during the opening credits, when the appearance of his name earned an audible gasp from the crowd and murmurs of happy surprise, and that feeling built during his first (absolutely hilarious!) scene when he was awarded huge laughs by the audience, and it

continued on throughout the entire film until he had the audience totally captivated! After the closing credits rolled, one of the film's producers came onstage for the Question and Answer session, and almost the very first thing he said was, "So -- how did you like seeing Mark Hamill -- were you surprised?" and the audience erupted into wild applause and cheering. (It brought a tear to me eye, it did! <G>) That applause really was well-deserved, because Mark truly gave an outstanding performance in this film. He handled both the dramatic as well as the comedic scenes with ease, and brought a lot of charm and humour to the movie, not to mention a wonderful southern drawl. (And let me tell you --"scruffy looking dogcatchers" never looked better!!)

CAUTION The following contains spoilers!!

Lamar/Mark was introduced quite early in the film, through a very humorous set of events. Mattie found a stray dog and, even though she obviously felt some affection for the dog, decided to call the dogcatcher to come by to pick up the mutt because she felt "too worn out" to take care of it. As Mattie waited for the dogcatcher to arrive, she attempted to sit down in her rocking chair to watch her "soaps," only she had forgotten that she had removed the seat from the rocker and she got her rear-end stuck (realllly stuck!) through the

hole in the seat of the rocker. The ensuing scene, where Lamar arrived at Mattie's house and discovered her uncomfortable situation, is hilarious! Mark did a great job with this scene -- both with the physical comedy as well as the verbal -and the audience laughed uproariously as Lamar struggled to free Mattie from her very embarrassing predicament.

Mark had several other great scenes in the film, but there was one in particular that was a crowd favorite (and was definitely one of mine, too!). Quite a few of the film's characters were gathered around Mattie's table for dinner, and Mattie asked Lamar to say "Grace" over the food. Lamar was flabbergasted at the request -- he obviously hadn't said a prayer in years, but with good humour (and after a "look" from Mattie) he agreed to do it. He clasped his hands, bowed his head, and (oh - this was SO sweet and funny!) proceeded to recite a prayer from his childhood. He prayed hesitantly at first, stumbling along as he tried to dredge his memory for the words, then gained steam and

got progressively more confident (and touchingly pleased with himself) with each line, until he built up to a triumphant "Amen!" at the end, accompanied by a hilariously childlike "Woohoo - I did it!" expression on his face that the crowd just LOVED!! That scene got lots and lots of laughs!

Ellen Burstyn did a wonderful job with her role as Mattie, and portrayed her with just the right touches of humor, feistiness, and kindness. She also brought to Mattie a hilariously unflappable attitude that Mattie developed to cope with all the chaos that Wesley brought into her life. In addition, Ms. Burstyn was called upon in this role to portray a woman who is motivated by deep and sincere religious convictions, and Ms. Burstyn admirably did this without even the slightest hint of selfrighteousness or pretentiousness. As Mattie unflinchingly stuck to her principles and tried to help Wesley -- despite mounting opposition and criticism from her son and daughter, her neighbors, and even her own clergyman -- we saw a portrait of a person who gave more than mere lip-service to "helping her fellow man." Mattie's faith and unquenchable spirit (and generous doses of her excellent homecooking) conquered in the end, and she quite literally saved the life of one of society's throwaway children.

Jonathan Taylor Thomas also handed in a very fine performance in this film. I had reservations prior to the screening about how believable JTT would be in the role of a juvenile delinquent (who is in a Youth Detention Center/RC when Mattie first meets him), but I was pleasantly surprised at how well JTT handled the challenge of acting convincingly tough and aggressive within the menacing environment of the RC. Jonathan's performance was outstanding throughout the film as he handled Wesley's gradual transition from toughened delinquent into charming rascal, and finally, in the very moving and heartrending climax of the film, into a young man who had internalized Mattie's lessons about gratitude, honesty and courage, and who chose to act in accordance with these newfound values even in dire circumstances.

Harve Presnell and Gwen Verdon were also particularly wonderful as Mattie's neighbors: kind-hearted, nosy, funny characters who tried to "watch over" Mattie and protect her from the "riff-raff" that Mattie had taken into her home.

The *only* thing that disappoints about this film is its lack of a distributor. It saddens me to think of all the people (and especially Markfans!) that may be deprived of seeing this movie if it is does not receive widespread distribution. The movie was extremely wellreceived at the screening I attended, and the audience thoroughly enjoyed the moments of humor as well as the drama contained in the film; I firmly believe "Walking Across Egypt" would also receive this same warm reception with a more widespread audience. This movie is positive, life-affirming, has an unabashedly good message to it, and deserves to be distributed—it will truly be a shame if it is not.

Blast From the Past

The FBI

A young man (Robert Ryders) spots a young woman next to the street having trouble with her bike. He invites her to come with him. After some hesitation. she agrees. He talks about planning a bank robbery and other criminal acts. but she thinks he's just joking. She soon learns about his true character. A highway patrol officer stops the car because he was driving too fast. Checking the car, the officer finds the car isn't stolen. Back in his car he is told that the car is stolen – so he goes back. Before he can talk with the driver, the driver shoots the officer..

Louis Erskin (Efram Zimbalist Jr), from the FBI, works with the local police. The wounded officer describes the young man, before falling into coma. A short while later they find the young woman. She tells them he took her hostage but then he let her go. He never mentioned his name but she saw him take painkillers, and she helps them make a sketch. Inspecting the car, they find a package of aspirin. Then they hear another truck has been stolen.

In a restaurant, the young man overhears the conversation of a teenage boy looking for a job with the owner. No openings – so the boy leaves his address – his name is George Arbot (Rick Culman). The young man invites him to lunch. Taking his revolver, the young man forces them to give him all the money from the cash register. Shocked, one of the other guests – a trucker tries to attack him. George gives him a warning and the young man shoots his attacker in the shoulder. He tells George to grab the money and the key of the car from another guest. After they left the police were called.

Stopping in a forest, George doesn't feel too well though he gets his part of the robbery money. After being warned he's too young and that the young man has a 'mission' to fulfill and is willing to take every risk, George still wants to be a partner. The young man eventually agrees and gives George his weapon as a gift – one of the many he has in his small travel case. Then they meet 2 other boys George had met 2 weeks ago - Roy Sheen and Michael Nabot. (One of them is played by Mark.) The boys are happy that George came back. They are looking for some thrills, too. Fascinated, they want to know how many jobs he has already pulled. They want to become partners – want to get their 'chance'. They'll have to pass a 'test' – they agree and get their own weapons.

Another young woman tells Erskin a bit more about George. He was hitchhiking and she picked him up. George fell in love with her – wanted more, but she wasn't willing. He called her repeatedly, and gave her his address. Erskin asks her to contact him again if George calls her again. Worried about the toothaches his partner has, George wants to take him to a dentist but he refuses, telling him his father almost died from one. And he starts talking about his plans, how he wants to get his younger brother out of jail because he feels responsible for him – no matter what. His brother killed a police officer and now awaits trial.

Erskin learns that George left his family weeks ago to have some 'adventures' - that he was never in trouble before. They found more evidence in the truck – a cloththat drenched with clove oil used when you have toothaches. He decides to give flyers to every drugstore owner and dentist in the area. George calls the young woman again but what he tells her doesn't make much sense to her: he has now a partner – a business man. He wants to call her again and then meet her at the 'Grovenor'. They find out it's a cinema. Once there, they wait. One of Erskin's team is near the entry, cleaning windows. Then 2 young men arrive – looking a bit nervous. It's the 'test' they have to pass: a robbery. But Erskin and his team arrest the boys who try to get away. Both boys are 18 years old. They only can tell Erskin that the young man is called Dall and that he plans something big.

Finally, George takes his partner to a dentist. The dental hygienist recognizes George and shows the doctor a small note asking him to call the police. He nods. When he tries to give Dall an anaesthetic, George interferes, beating up the doc and leaving with Dall. He still thinks he's Dall's partner but Dall pushes him out of the car. He has to fulfill his mission now alone. Frustrated, he does his first own robbery. During his escape he crashes with a motorbike and hurts his knee.

The owner of the store tells the FBI about that crash – so they know where to look for him. A short while later they find George in Whiteside Emergency Hospital waiting for the doctor. They arrest him. George is worried that his parents will find him in jail to he is willing to help Erskin. He tells them that Dall plans to free his brother. Now they know how he is: D. Victor Foster.

Looking at the newspaper Dall learns that the trial has been delayed. Frustrated he takes hostages to free his brother. Grant. He wants to talk with his brother – but he didn't like what he tells him that he has already ruined his live and that he doesn't want that his brother frees him. Erskin confronts Foster that has a grenade in his hand. He knows that he has much more in his bag. During a short fight he managed to get hold of the grenade and it detonates outside in the hall.

D. Victor Foster is arrested for murder and the 3 young men, for robbery.
