'Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back' Billy Williams

Warning: SPOILER ALERT!!

Despite the obvious parallel in the title and logo with "The Empire Strikes Back", I went to this movie without knowing that Mark was in it. (My teenage son talked me into going). The film is full of gross and crude humor, which may appeal to you or turn you off...very few will be neutral.

The title heroes are parodied in a comic (graphic novel) as Bluntman and Chronic. When they learn that a movie will be made of their characters, that they will not share in the earnings, and that they are being ill spoken of on the internet movie chat, they set off...with no money... for Hollywood, intending to stop the film. After many adventures along the way, including an encounter with Carrie Fisher, they arrive at Miramax Studios.

After being chased all around the studio, they manage to switch places with the actors portraying their characters, who are hauled away by the guards



and officers who have been chasing Jay and Silent Bob. Then, during a take on this movie within a movie, Mark makes his entrance as Bluntman and Chronic's enemy, Cock Knocker. There ensues, of all things, a lightsabre battle, during which it appears that Mark still has all his quickness and agility from his "Star Wars" days...even as he warns his adversaries "not to fool with a Jedi Master". Indeed, it becomes obvious that Mark really enjoyed playing this part, or just put everything into doing his best work, or both. Unfortunately, from his character's viewpoint, he eventually loses the battle to an inspired Jay. More importantly, he loses his hand (where have we seen that before?), and the way

he says "not again" before he storms back to his room gave me my best laugh of the movie.

Evidently, Kevin Smith, who wrote, directed, and starred in the movie as Silent Bob...felt this scene to be so impor-

tant that he announced Mark's entrance on the screen in bold writing..."Hey kids, it's Mark Hamill" so all would know right away. Mark's costume indeed bore little resemblance to Luke Skywalker, but as the scene went on, I honestly think I would have done more than just suspect it was Mark. The point is, if this movie was made for laughs, Mark's scene had the best in my opinion. I think it was because, big or small, Mark works at being the best he can be.

For the movie as a whole.. well, I would prefer the inspiration of "Walking Across Egypt", but then where would we be without some good laughs?

Amadeus Touring Company:



Peter Shaffer's award winning play is based on the relationship between Mozart and Antonio Salieri. In later life, Salieri claimed to have killed Mozart with poison. The two act play focuses on the period between 1781 and 1791, from Salieri's point of view.

Mark originally tried out for the New York company of 'Amadeus', and was put on stand-by. Peter Firth was able to get his green card. Mark was offered, and accepted, the lead in 'Elephant Man'. The producers kept him in mind, and when the part of



Amadeus opened up in the touring company, Mark auditioned. He did approximately three hundred performances before being called to Broadway. He did another one hundred nine performances before the play closed.

Preparing for the role

had Mark visiting Vienna, learning to play the piano, and reading biographies of Mozart, to get a sense of the foul-mouthed, immature genius.

To the apparent surprise of most critics reviewing the touring company's various openings, Mark put on a very creditable performance. As one put it, 'From his first swift entrance as the boisterous brat composer, he obliterates all "Star Wars" identification and becomes instead the very childish genius who Shaffer wishes to portray.'

Prior work commitments made Mark unavailable to be cast as Mozart in the film version of 'Amadeus'. The role was filled by Tom Hulce, who has said he based his Mozart on Mark's stage interpretation.



TIME Squad



I was finally able to catch an episode of 'Time Squad', and in short, I'm out to get a new vcr that has a working timer! Two cartoons per half hour episode, I came in on the middle of the first, an alternate universe where Abe Lincoln ran around with his cabinet members, pulling pranks on people. Larry 3000 (Mark's character), Otto, a young boy voiced by Pamela Segall Adlon, and Officer Toddrussel (Rob Paulson) need to show him the error of his ways,

and get him back in line with history. Pulling a series of time-honoured pranks in quick succession, culminating in the delivery of a dozen anchovy pizzas, has Abe declaring 'I don't know what kind of sicko would do this'. The good guys talk with him, Abe thanks them, and tells them he'd never stopped to think what it was like for the victims of his shenanigans. He then declares he's off to pick up Mrs Lincoln 'and head over to the theatre for an evening of light entertainment.'

The second segment ends with Blackbeard and his pirates donating 10% of their pirating profits to saving the oceans and reef relief. Blackbeard's parrot notes that 'Doing good is it's own reward.'

Grab a tape, set the vcr timer for Cartoon Network Friday nights 9 pm ET! This is definitely a good series- wonderful family watching together stuff. A bit of history, a moral at the end of the story, and good fun and laughs throughout.
